

Genealogy - Exploring Your Family Tree

We have now had three sessions commencing 3rd September to explore family history and how to start and develop your family tree. The sessions are very interactive and have developed into a workshop where we explore and find ancestors as a group.

The sessions started with an outline on how to start the task of finding our ancestors using various references and sources. A methodical approach is required, as much information includes dates and locations here and overseas, such as in the United Kingdom. Some sources are, besides birth, marriage and death and burial records, shipping and immigration registers and convict and legal decisions.

Our group of seven participants has brought along questions and queries - where to look and how to record. Thus, we are now developing the sessions into a monthly workshop where existing and new persons can join us as we explore our family heritage.

For example: this session, we went on the internet and found the convict records for a George Perkins and his brother Robert. (These records are accessible online and access is free). It was fascinating and enlightening to learn he had been transported to Tasmania in 1833 on a ship, the Isabella. His crime was "attempting to kill a gamekeeper"! He, along with his brother, were convicted in the Rutland Assizes Court in England. Later, he is recorded working as a convict in Tasmania. The search continues.

Australia is fortunate to have many sources of information such as "Trove", the online branch of the National Library; Australian military personnel records from various wars and State Civil Archives (births, marriages and deaths). We also explore some of the online family history applications and software packages.

We plan to continue our workshops with tentative dates of the second Wednesday of each month (to be confirmed). **Please NOTE**: New members are most welcome at whatever stage you are in your research, and even if you have not even started, we can get you started to catch the family History Bug.

For Information: I commenced researching my family history when I was 18 years old and have been developing my tree on and off for some fifty-five years. For a short time, I was a General Manager of Genealogy Society of Victoria. My journey has meant I have met or corresponded with many people (cousins, etc) that I would have never met. I am very happy to help you along this journey of discovery.



Report from the Fourth Wednesday Book Group - 'Compassion'



The Fourth Wednesday Book Group recently read and discussed 'Compassion' by Julie Janson, chosen after she had spoken about it at the Tathra Writers Festival in 2024. It was generally found to be an interesting account of the often brutal handling of Indigenous tribes as well as convicts during early colonial times, but it was written in a style that many found initially difficult.

It tells the story of a white fathered Aboriginal girl coming to physical maturity and attempting to escape the attentions of the farm owner she works for, as well as trying to escape the alternative of oppressive discipline and incarceration that she endures. The story tells about her experiences while trying to find her mother and her place among the local tribes, and about the life she leads, escaping from the law.

It was the side of the colonial society that was glossed over or ignored in much of the history that we studied, and Julie Janson writes her story based on that of one of her ancestors who went on trial for stealing livestock in early New South Wales.

Comments from some of the group included:

Kathy Sims: "For me, 'Compassion' was a difficult book to get into because initially I found it difficult to follow. At about one third of the way, it became a lot easier as the characters became more familiar. I liked the book. It challenged me - the story was not about evoking pity for Indigenous people, rather it gave me an insight into what colonial life was like from an Indigenous perspective. I admired Nell's ability to keep going, even optimistically, in the face of many obstacles. I felt the book improved my understanding of Indigenous relationships and the effects of colonisation on the people".

Jacqui Goodman: "I really struggled with this book. It was certainly well written and maybe that was just too much for me at that time. I think I'm feeling more mortal and consequently, any privation, any hardship, any conflict and abuse of power, gets to me. It's historical fact that we, white settlers, practised so-called "gentle genocide". It's something to be acknowledged as true and not denied. If things were better for our First Nation people these days, it would be easier to read. But it's not and I'm sorry. I had to stop reading for a while, but I did eventually finish it and the plot did get easier and was more welcome reading. I've listened to Julie Janson on ABC radio and like her very much".

Jennifer Dessens: "The strong characterisation and immediate sense of place made for a good read, especially in presenting that time in colonial Australia. Hard for all!"

Roz Hansen: "I really struggled to finish 'Compassion' but did finally get to the last page. I became very bored and irritated by the story. Didn't seem to go anywhere other than more of the same language, appalling treatment of females, constant reference to female anatomy, and personal struggles one after another. Whilst I was shocked by the white colonists' treatment of Aboriginals, etc. I found the ending flat and all I could feel was - and so what? Why have I got this far in the book and feel totally deflated and uninspired? Enough said. Obviously. I didn't like the book at all!"



U3ASC Website Monthly Focus: ONE-OFF'S AND SHORT COURSES

www.sapphirecoastu3a.org

There are several ways on the U3ASC website to easily find what is available in the way of One-off's or Short Courses, as opposed to just clicking on the COURSES button and going through the entire list.

ONE-OFF COURSES

On the home page, you can click on the ONE-OFF EVENTS button. Alternatively, you can click on the MEMBERS AREA on the home page, then select ONE-OFF EVENTS from the drop-down menu.



Here, you will find a good overview of the One-off Courses including the date. If you find one that appeals, you can then Log-in (by whichever way you are most comfortable) and enrol.

Another way you can access One-off Courses is to click on the COURSES button on the home page, then click on the One-off Events button. This takes you to the full database entry for the course, giving additional information including cost, location, contact person, etc. You are able to Log-in directly from this page by clicking on the Login button towards the top of the page to enrol in the One-off Course of your choice.

SHORT COURSES

For Short Courses, you will need to click on the MEMBERS AREA on the home page, then select SHORT COURSES from the drop-down menu. Here, you will find a good overview of the Short Courses, including the date. You can then enrol in the Short Course of your choice.
