PRESIDENT'S REPORT



Here's a brief report on how things went last year as I see it.

The short answer, I think, is not too badly.

I think the Management Team's best achievement was to keep an annual fee increase at bay a further year. There was no increase last year. And there will be no increase this year.

yet we managed to still pay all our bills last year and keep the ship afloat, and things are also looking good for this year as well.

Note that while our revenue from last year remained steady, our bills did not, and have not, remained steady. This means a fee increase cannot be avoided forever.

But, in spite of that, we still have enough money in the bank to cover roughly a year's operation should all revenue dry up.

I should mention that while we ran a deficit of nearly \$6000 in 2023 compared to under \$2000 the previous year, this is a bit misleading, as Judy alluded to.

For one thing, we had to pay two Christmas party bills in 2023 totally \$5000 while none were payable in 2022. In addition, we were receiving a \$2000 subsidy from our landlord in 2022 to help us out with COVID.

Another significant achievement in 2023 was to be able to present a delectable range of course morsels to members throughout the year, thanks to the Program Team and our course coordinators.

I should also mention that while it is technically not last year's initiative, we have upgraded our online annual fee payment system recently. This has been a source of some irritation to members for some years. Hopefully things are much easier now.

So things continue to run smoothly, I think-my goal in coming into this job.

The main ongoing challenge for the organisation as I see it to obtaining a steady stream of volunteers to take over from the steady stream of volunteers who have done their bit for the organisation and need to move on because of family issues, illness or plain burn out. There is no simple answer but it's an issue we need to constantly focus on as we move forward, as we are.

Before moving on, I need to thank some people.

As I said last year, I don't plan to single out individuals since all our volunteers operate in teams. I put a very high value, the highest in fact, on teamwork and I propose to thank our teams, not the individuals within them.

Suicide Prevention For Seniors Program

Would you like to learn how to help prevent suicide? This program provides evidence-based accredited training and practical strategies in suicide prevention, including how to have a conversation with empathy, determine whether the person is having thoughts of suicide, and support the person with a safety plan and referral. In addition, this training will teach you about the common causes of suicidal behaviour and particular issues surrounding suicide in older adults, including risk and protective factors.

The program takes 3 hours, online via Zoom, and is free, funded by the Australian and NSW Governments. It's for anyone who works closely with older people, including carers, professionals and concerned family members or friends.

RUBIK'S CUBE BEGINNER'S METHOD COURSE

Would you consider being a U3A Sapphire Coast Course Leader for a Rubik's Cube Beginner's Method Course or would you just like to have a red-hot go at solving the Rubik's Cube? Barry Lynch has taught a course on the Rubik's Cube Beginner's Method at U3A Redcliffe, creating tutorial videos in the process. He is offering them on his Cryptic site.

The Beginner's Method requires students to commit six short algorithms to memory, and this is a wonderful exercise for the brain. Using these algorithms, students will train their minds and fingers to work together, just as they would if learning to play the piano.

The course was very successful at Redcliffe, and Barry was thrilled when some of his U3A students told him they enjoyed showing their skills to their grandchildren. Now they will be able to watch the YouTube videos with their grandchildren on their home TV, so that they can all enjoy learning together. Any such bonding is one of the ultimate enjoyments a grandparent can experience, and U3A members, with all their knowledge, are uniquely set up to enjoy this.

This would be a wonderful course to include in our U3A programme. Besides learning the algorithms, students will also learn all the usual terms and techniques, and will be well prepared to take on the faster (expert) method, if they wish.


To keep these videos separate from Barry's Cryptics ABC videos, he has put them in the category for subscribers only. Subscribers are notified whenever new videos are added.


The tutorials are designed so that the Course Leader does not need to know how to solve the Rubik's cube, in order to run the course. The only prerequisite is that all students will need to front up with a Rubik's cube (original colours please – white, yellow, green, blue, red, brown) for the first lesson. Kmart usually supplies them for about \$20;

BEEKEEPING WORKSHOP - A BUZZWORTHY SUCCESS!

I recently attended an informative workshop led by Apiarist Stephen Targett who is very passionate about his bees and their hives and with good reason. Bees are a vital part of our ecology and crucial in pollination of our fruit trees, vegetables and the beautiful gardens we enjoy so much. Stephen was a commercial beekeeper for 28 years before selling his business and still manages 10 of his own mainly for honey and pollination in Spring.

Stephen gave three engaging and educational sessions including beekeeping for the beginner, the fascinating world of bees, the role of the queen in hives, worker bees and drones, identification of the different types of cells within the hive and honey production. He also shared some slides on native bees and their habitats. Did you know there are around 2000 native bee species endemic to Australia? We had a taste test at the conclusion and it was interesting to taste the different types of honey produced from the bees depending upon the various trees they are pollinating and gathering their nectar from.

Participants left inspired to transform their own green spaces into havens for bees and other pollinators. U3A Sapphire Coast would like to thank Stephen for his willingness to share his knowledge on bees. A further Spring One-Off Bee Hive interactive field visit is planned. This interactive workshop will demonstrate a live working hive and further knowledge and education on owning and managing your very own bee hive.
