

UNDERSTANDING BUSHFIRES – A not-to-be missed ONE-OFF Wednesday December13 2023.



With this summer predicted to be not just potentially, but probably, a devastating bushfire season, it's never been more important for us all to understand exactly what bushfires are, how they behave, and how to plan and prepare for them.

Bruce Leaver has delivered this One Off already in Bermagui and has kindly agreed to also do it for us before the worst of the bushfire season hits.

Bruce has an extensive background in fire management. He has a Bachelor of Science (Forestry) Degree which included subjects in physics, chemistry, botany and bushfire science. His career

was in forestry, and national park and heritage management in NSW, SA, Tas and the Commonwealth. He served on the NSW Bushfire Council Co-ordinating Committee, the SA Bushfire Prevention Council, and the ACT Bushfire Council (twice, with a 15 year gap). He has experience in all levels of fire control and fire protection management from basic crew to wildfire controller.

Those of us who have attended Bruce's other talks for us can recommend him as a presenter. He is incredibly knowledgeable, easy to understand and entertaining. And this time, it's on a subject that should be mandatory learning for all of us in regional Australia.



FILM REVIEW - BLADE RUNNER FINAL CUT.

Blade Runner is a 1982 science fiction film directed by Ridley Scott and is an adaptation of Philip K. Dick's 1968 novel *Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep*? The film is set in a dystopian or a failed utopian future (Los Angeles of 2019), in which synthetic humans known as replicants, are created by the Tyrell Corporation to work off-world in space colonies. These synthetic humans remind me of the Synths in the television series HUMANS where this supposedly artificial life form develops feelings and a desire to survive, thus becoming a threat to human existence. In both of these scenarios, Synths and Replicants are exploited and used by humans until they rise up against them to fight for their freedom.

Although made in the 1980's, this film has so much to say to us today as we grapple with issues of human identity, the reality of climate change, the influential power of large multinational corporations, the creation (and threat) of artificial intelligence and the prospect of travelling to outer space, or off world, as it is referred to in the film. Characters appear to be alone and without an intimate partner; one of the characters, JS Sebastion, literally 'makes friends' in the form of animated puppets. Strangely, it is the replicants and not the human characters, who demonstrate compassion and love

for one another; leaving the viewer to wonder if anyone in the film is, in fact, a human being. Well worth another look, if like me, you have the DVD somewhere in your old collection, if not, you'll find it on Netflix, where you can also catch the sequel, Blade Runner 2049.

REVIEW – NOMADIC CONTINENTS ONE-OFF BY BRUCE LEAVER

Bruce's talk was, as always, illustrated with 174 excellent slides – which gives you some idea of the amount of material he covered, and the difficulties of summarising it meaningfully for those of you who didn't get to his talk.

So, I'm going to be fairly meaningless about it all and just talk about a couple of my personal take aways.

Even though cartographers had noticed centuries earlier that the continents looked as if they once fitted together (particularly Africa and America), they had no idea how their separation could have happened. It wasn't until the 1970s (yes, that recently) that there was final understanding and acceptance of the processes of continental drift and plate tectonics. I also find it slightly mindboggling that the coming together and separation of the continents has happened over and over again through the long history of our planet – and will happen again. If we're still alive in 50,000 years (I just made that number up – a very long time anyway), Australia will once again be joined to Indonesia as it drifts north at 7.8 cm a year (I might have made that number up too). But you get the drift – yeah, a pun!

And yes, maybe here is where I should talk a bit about the science but I'm not going to. If you'd like to know about the science, email me on programs.u3asc1@gmail.com and I'll send you the file of Bruce's slides.

As a lover of Lessons in Chemistry by Bonnie Garmus, I can't resist adding another story to the huge, mainly untold story of women's contributions to science. The paradigm shift in earth science thinking that led to understanding and acceptance of plate tectonics was made possible by Marie Thorpe in 1953. She painstakingly waded through oceans of sonar soundings and hand plotted them onto a chart (this was pre-computers) that showed the spread of the ocean floor out from the 10,000 mile long mid Atlantic Ridge. Can you even imagine a chart showing a 10,000 mile ridge, let alone one hand plotted?



I'm sure you'll all be amazed to know that Marie's findings were dismissed as 'girl talk', while the male geoscience establishment, as those establishments did, egregiously plagiarised her work and took all the credit. Marie was finally recognised for her work in 1997.

As always, a hugely informative talk by Bruce. Check the U3A Program, and article in this newsletter, for details of his next one, on Wednesday December 13. It's on a massively important subject, bush-fires and how they behave.

REVIEW – MERIMBULA MARINE RESCUE ONE-OFF HELD ON TUESDAY OCTOBER 31.

A visit to Merimbula Marine Rescue base in the Anglers Club, Spencer Park delivered in spades. The professionalism, knowledge and experience these volunteers shared was of the highest level. We are in good hands.

Marine Rescue NSW not only saves lives on the water but assists the boating community by providing a rapid response 24/7 and by offering safety and education training to the boating public.

We extend a special thank you to MMR Unit Commander Bill Blakeman (who incidentally has been named as a finalist in the Safety category tor the 2023 Community Achievement Awards NSW & ACT) and Deputy Unit Commander Sonia Teston for such an interesting presentation and for showing us over the facilities. These included the training room, the radio control centre and the two rescue vessels.

Merimbula Marine Rescue is funded by the NSW Government's levy on boat registrations and boat licences, but this provides less than half of annual operating expenses. The rest needs to be raised locally, so MMR Volunteers also organise fundraising activities such as Bingo at the RSL, BBQs, and raffles.


