ONE-OFF REVIEW - IS GULAGA A VOLCANO?

Who would have thought that, to establish whether Gulaga is/was a volcano, you'd have to start 250 million years ago with the break-up of Pangea and the rift that ultimately created the Tasman Sea? To a time when Merimbula was some 400 km inland and mountains were thousands of feet higher - or not even mountains at all!



But that's what it takes and Bruce Leaver took us on

a fascinating journey through the next 150 million plus years via subjects such as the different types of volcanoes, the different rocks that come out, or don't come out, of the different types of volcanoes, how you can identify long gone volcanoes in a landscape, the erosion rates (very, very, fast) of volcanoes, and where all that eroded stuff went to.

The ultimate answer to Is Gulaga a Volcano? Bruce's answer is No. It's an igneous intrusion associated with a much larger volcano that eroded away some 90 million years ago.

And if you don't understand that, come to one of Bruce's talks next year and I'm sure you'll catch up. He has some 14 talks he's willing to give for us on topics as diverse as the emergence of grasses and fungi on the planet to (the one I'm hanging out for) When Birds ate Horses.

"Mindfulness" One Off Event





If you would like to join us at the Tura Beach Country Club on Fridays at 10.00am. bring your hand work and join our friendly group. We love new faces.


