# PRESIDENT'S REPORT ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING FOLLOW-UP

One interesting thing that occurred at the Annual General Meeting (AGM) on March 31, beyond the formal agenda, was a general discussion of various issues among everyone present.

The Management Team agreed to carry the discussions forward at its next monthly meeting on April 27, and here's a summary of our further

deliberations.

One suggestion from the floor at the AGM was that we consider conducting Bermagui-style enrolment days at the start of each term, with presenters present.

In the end, the Management Team agreed to stick with our present online enrolment arrangements since Bermagui itself has dropped

registration days, as we did some time ago. In addition, these events are considerable logistical exercises, people can now enrol online, and we have Team Office to help people with their enrolments.

The second issue was a broadranging discussion about how to boost enrolments (they're going back up post-COVID, but only slowly), and there were lots of great suggestions.

In the end, the Management Team on April 27 felt the key strategies should be, firstly, to present potential members with as attractive a package of courses as we can and, secondly, that we develop an accompanying, simple public relations strategy to raise our local profile. Of course, we're constantly focused on this issue and won't be restricting ourselves to just these approaches.

The Management Team also agreed on April 27 on the broad thrust of such a PR strategy. Stay tuned from me for further developments. Remember, though, we are talking about a "simple" strategy.

The third AGM-initiated discussion was about problems people were having using PayPal to pay their annual enrolment fee.

This is a difficult one. People are definitely having problems, but it seems that our payment system is an intrinsic part of our database operation, which is managed nationally for U3A in Victoria.

The Management Team resolved to have further discussions with Team Office and the Victorian database people about the way forward. Stay tuned.

So, it was a lively AGM, and definitely a very helpful one for the Management Team. Don't forget you can email me, or any member of the Management Team, at any time to make comments or suggestions.





## FOURTH WEDNESDAY BOOK GROUP

The Fourth Wednesday Book Group has begun the year reading and discussing books which highlight the changed status of women today compared to the lives of women in past centuries. The topic seems to be one many authors are addressing in recently published novels focusing on the limited opportunities and power of women in the past.


We began with a personal choice of a Jane Austen novel and though our group had some




dissenters, most of the us were once again delighted and amazed at Austen's ability to appeal to early 19<sup>th</sup> century readers while continuing to be read enthusiastically through the centuries since with stories that still translate to our times. Her subtle irony and humorous descriptions of the foibles of her characters and her writing style, that still reads well in text or read aloud as an audiobook (or a script for film or television), must have been particularly entertaining to the media starved readers of her time.

Though Jane Austen was writing mainly about an upper and middle class sector of society our second book this year, *The Mercies* by Kiran Millwood Hargrave, focused on the lives of struggling village women in the remote Norwegian island of Vardo in the early seventeenth century. Based on a true story, Hargrave writes her fictional account, elaborating a detailed story of the terrible 1617 storm which drowned the menfolk of Vardo and left the women to fend for themselves.

Surviving independently and managing to feed and organise themselves for eighteen months, the village of women with such independent power was perceived as a threat by the Norwegian authorities. Absolom Cornet, a Scottish minister with experience in Scottish witch hunts, is asked to be commissioner and his arrival, with a new young wife, quickly changes the power balance in the village. The story is based on the 1621 witch trials in Vardo and focuses particularly on the relationships of women in the village including the imagining of the experiences of Absolom's wife, Ursa. The story is poetically and dramatically told in the present tense and portrays a much bleaker time of male dominance supported by religion and authority. Our book group were all impressed by the author's style and her imaginative story but affected by descriptions of the harsh environment and the treatment of any women who showed independence in those times.



Our third book, *The Marriage Portrait* by Maggie O'Farrell, took us back even further to 1560s Florence where Lucrezia de' Medici is raised and married to Alfonso d'Este, ruler of Ferrara,



Modena and Reggio. Again, this is a reimagining of real characters and relationships with fictional characterisations woven around historical facts. The powerlessness of a teenage bride with a powerful ruler as her husband to command her life is described from Lucrezia's perspective, again expressed in the present tense with a poetic style. Our group admired the author's descriptions of the scenes of the lives of the rich as well as the lives of their attending servants.

The book inspired a spirited discussion about the acceptance, in those times, of arranged marriages and the husband's complete control over his wife's life. We agreed we're thankful to have had life opportunities and personal power and freedom as women living in current times.
